

Seminar Partnership Urban Poverty From Scoping Paper to Action Plan



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1. Introduction

Under the Dutch Presidency of the Council of the European Union in the first half of 2016, the Urban Agenda for the EU was taken to the next level by the endorsement of the "Pact of Amsterdam" (30 May 2016). This Pact between Member States, the European Commission, local authorities, knowledge organisations and other urban actors sets out the key principles of the Urban Agenda for the EU and provides an operational framework for improving the urban dimension of EU-policies.

At the heart of the Urban Agenda for the EU is the development of twelve partnerships on twelve identified priority themes (see Appendix I). These thematic partnerships are considered key delivery mechanisms within the Urban Agenda for the EU. Each partnership will focus on measures to make better use of existing EU regulations and funding in relation to urban areas. Furthermore, it will showcase and share best practice knowledge and evidence on what works (PA 2016).

Each partnership has around 15 to 20 members and is made up of urban authorities, the European Commissions, EU organisations, Member States, Partner States experts, umbrella organisations, knowledge organisations, and other urban actors or stakeholders. Also, each partnership has coordinators that will chair the meetings, and who are the main point of contact for the members, and other interested actors. The partnership is expected to achieve results over the course of about three years, after which the collaboration is continued or terminated, based on decision by the partners. In principle, each partnership will go through the following five stages: 1) stocktaking, 2) preparatory actions, 3) defining the objectives and deliverables, 4) implementation of an Action Plan, and 5) evaluation of the partnership (PA 2016).

In each Action Plan concrete proposals will be formulated for Better Regulation, Better Funding, and Better Knowledge in order to realise the full potential of the EU. These proposals are considered non-binding contributions to the design of future, and revision of existing, EU legislation, instruments, and initiatives (PA 2016). The Action Plans should formulate specific recommendations and/or initiatives that are ready to be implemented (UDG 2016).

Currently, the following four (pilot) partnerships have started with the support of the Dutch presidency: Air quality, Housing, the Inclusion of migrants and refugees, and Urban Poverty.

The latter is coordinated by two EU Member States: France and Belgium, with the support of DG Regio, and it is on this partnership that this document focuses.

2. Partnership Urban Poverty

The partnership on urban poverty will focus on two main areas In relation to the main topic, namely:

- Urban poverty considered within the perspective of an area-based approach, i.e.
 urban poverty as a spatial phenomena manifesting itself in specific urban areas, in particular deprived urban neighbourhoods;
- Urban poverty considered within the perspective of a people-based approach, in particular focussing on child poverty.

It is the ambition of the partnership to integrate these two approaches: poverty is, by its very nature, a complex problem where many different sectoral policy approaches come together. It is the ambition of the partnership to combine these approaches. Obviously, linkages wit other Partnerships will be explored, in particular with the Partnership dealing with Inclusion of Migrants and Refugees and the Partnership dealing with Housing.

Like the other Urban Agenda Partnerships, the Partnership on Urban Poverty will take into account the EU focus on Better Regulation, Better Funding, and Better Knowledge. The two sub-themes of the Partnership will be considered within the perspective of three main objectives (Partnership factsheet 2016):

- Better regulation: how to improve EU legislation so that it better reflects urban needs practices and responsibilities?
- Better use of financial instruments: how to ensure better access to and utilisation of European funds by Urban Areas?
- Better knowledge exchange: How to improve the EU urban knowledge base and stimulate the sharing of best practices and cooperation between Urban Areas?

Alongside the two coordinators, the French Commissariat Général à l'Égalité des Territoires (CGET) and the Belgium PPS Social Integration, the following member states are currently represented in the partnership: Germany, Spain and Greece, as well as the cities of Lille, Kortrijk, Birmingham, LODZ, Timisoara, Daugavpils, Bruxelles-Capital, Ile-de-France, and a

number of European organisations: URBACT, EUKN, EAPN, UN Habitat, FEANTSA and Eurochild. From the European Commission's side both DG REGIO and DG EMPL participate.

Two urban experts – Laura Colini and Iván Tosics – provide support to the Partnership. The experts have written a Scoping Paper providing a thematic overview of the topic. The paper identifies key issues, analyses policy approaches, describes policy approaches and discusses specific problems and options for an EU approach to combat urban poverty within the framework of the Urban Agenda for the EU.

3. Objective Seminar

With the recent Scoping Paper, the partnership is currently entering the second stage of managing the "preparatory actions" whereby the bottlenecks and potentials of the issues at stake are identified. Subsequently, the European Urban Knowledge Network (EUKN) will provide additional support to the Partnership by organising a Seminar to discuss the main topics of the Urban Poverty Partnership with a variety of experts: researchers, practitioners at various governmental levels, but also non-governmental actors such as civil society organisations.

This Seminar will depart from the Scoping Paper and will offer interactive workshops to provide a critical reflection on the main topics discussed in the paper. These sessions will discuss the main topics of the Scoping Paper and will generate input for the next phase of the Partnership: the definition of the objectives and deliverables, which constitute the core of the Partnership's Action Plan.

The Seminar will result in a report, drafted by the EUKN, wherein the main findings of the Seminar will be summarised. This report will be largely based on the results of the interactive workshop sessions that form an important part of the Seminar. It is expected that the report will provide valuable input both for the final version of the Scoping Paper and the Action Plan.

4. Schedule and working method

To fully benefit from the pooled knowledge and experience, we propose an interactive and dynamic Seminar of one full day. The Seminar will be set up as an "intellectual pressure cooker". This is the main reason why the number of keynote speeches will be limited to give as much as possible room for interactive discussions in workshops. After the official word of welkome by the City of Athens and the opening speech by the French coordinator, Mr Eric Briat, Deputy Director for urban and social cohesion (CGET, France) who will introduce the audience to the Urban Poverty Partnership, the keynote speech by Mr. Philippe DeCoene, Deputy Mayor of Kortrijk (Belgium) responsible for Social Affairs including anti-poverty, will set the scene. Next, the two authors of the Scoping Paper, Mrs laura Colini and Mr Iván Tosics, will present their background document.

The workshops will cover the main areas dealt with in the scoping paper. These areas are:

- 1. Identification of Urban Poverty;
- 2. Urban Poverty, Welfare and the Labour Market;
- 3. Urban Poverty and Public Services; and
- 4. Child Poverty.

The method used for the workshops is explained below and in Annex 1. The Seminar will be chaired by Mart Grisel, chair of the EUKN EGTC.

After the two rounds with workshops, Prof. Thomas Maloutas will reflect on the outcome of the Workshops, followed by a speech by the Belgian coordinator of the Partnership, who will formulate concrete steps for further action in order to move from the Scoping Paper to the Action Plan.

4.1. Sessions

The working language for all sessions will be English. This means that the expert participating in the Seminar will need to be able to speak English in order to participate in the debates. The Seminar is set up as an intellectual pressure cooker. This is the reason why there will be only a very limited number of keynote speeches, actually only three: a short word of welcome by the hosting city, Athens, and two content related keynotes: one to set the scope of the seminar, and one to present the scoping paper drafted by the two experts.

The eight workshops form an essential part of the Seminar, since experts working together in the workshops will discuss the four main aspects of the Scoping Paper (round I) and will formulate concrete actions to be included in the Action Plan, in relation to the same four thematic areas (Round II). This bring the total to eight workshops. The chosen method allows experts to participate fully in two of the eight workshops. The experts will be divided into four subgroups based on a balanced composition of different professional backgrounds. The workshops have a maximum of 20 experts each.

These four themes that constitute the core of the eight workshops are:

- 1. Identification of Urban Poverty;
- 2. Urban Poverty, Welfare and the Labour Market, with a special focus on vulnerable groups;
- 3. Urban Poverty and Public Services; and
- 4. Child Poverty.

Before lunch the first round of four workshops will take place (90 minutes each). After Lunch there will be a second round of the same workshops (90 minutes) with a new group of participants. This means that all participants can participate in two of the four workshops. The first round will be focusing on the current Scoping Paper, the second round will build on the experience of the first round and will formulate concrete actions to be included in the Action Paper.

Each workshop will have two moderators: one policy maker and a technical expert. The two moderators will be responsible for generating concrete results at the end of ech workshop.

This implies that the moderators of each workshop will have an important and demanding task. They will have to facilitate and structure the discussions, while safeguarding the overall quality and continuity of the sessions. Therefore, all moderators will be extensively briefed before the Seminar.

Furthermore, in order to stimulate as much as possible the discussions among the experts, we propose to ask the participants beforehand to think of one exemplary bottleneck/potential in their field. Also, the chairs in the rooms will be arranged in a wide circle to facilitate an active participation of all.

The first workshop round will kick off with presentations from experts to set the scene.

The first workshop round will depart from the relevant scoping papers. The scoping papers will be sent to all participants at least one week before the Seminar takes place, in order to ensure optimal preparation. The sessions start with a plenary discussion of the main points raised in the scoping papers. Guided by relevant questions, interaction, and group discussion each session will conclude with concrete recommendations for the thematic issue of the scoping paper discussed in the workshop.

The second workshop will depart from the results of the first workshop and will focus on the formulation of concrete actions to be included in the Action Plan. These actions should focus on the key three priorities of the Urban Agenda for the EU Partnerships:

- 1. Better regulation;
- 2. Better funding;
- 3. Better knowledge (exchange).

This focus is important since the Partnerships are supposed to provide recommendations in order to strengthen the urban dimension in urban policy at the European level. Therefore, all experts – researchers, policy makers and practitioners at all governmental levels – will be invited to think about concrete actions to improve these three areas when dealing with urban poverty at the European level. Input form members states, regions and cities, including URBACT cities, is needed to formulate bottlenecks and possible solutions.

4.2. SPEEDBOAT method – An Innovation Game for Workshops



About Speedboat

Speedboat is an innovation game that helps to structure workshops about any given topic. It is designed to efficiently identify constraints and obstacles, as well as to prioritise them and to formulate solutions. Speedboat is especially suitable for relatively small groups.

Working Method

The procedure is as follows: you draw a speedboat on a whiteboard or flip chart. The boat represents the current situation (existing instruments/legislation/knowledge). Next to the speedboat you draw an island. This represents the point you want to reach. Participants are asked to work in pairs on the formulation of desirable conditions/outcomes. These conditions/outcomes are then presented to the group and plenary discussed. When all final conditions/outcomes have been agreed upon, they are put on the island with sticky notes.

Subsequently, the anchors are formulated, either individually or in small groups. E.g. what prevents you from reaching the island? Participants are asked to place their anchors under the speedboat (with a sticky note). The lower under water the anchor is placed; the more this issue is holding you back. Once all anchors are placed, they are prioritised collectively. Following prioritisation, solutions are discussed plenary. Finally, the session is closed with the formulation of an action plan that describes how the major anchors (in order of importance) on that particular issue can be removed.

Speedboat's Guiding Principles

- Make it visual: visual tools and exercise lead to more tangible and more strategic conversations.
- Use Sticky notes: sticky notes keep your ideas movable and flexible. Every idea should be presented on a single sticky note
- Use short work bursts and apply strict time keeping: moving from plenary discussion to quick work bursts keeps the workshop dynamic. In general people have a tendency to spend more time talking then necessary to accomplish a goal.
- Focus on one topic and finish it before moving to the next: talking about too many things at the same time goes at the expense of clarity and logic.
- Evolve ideas together: Every idea is considered seriously rather than simply passed judgement on. When you look at things as prototypes instead of final outcomes you are more likely to help evolve them.

4.3. Speakers and moderators

EUKN's director Mart Grisel will chair the Seminar. He will guide the speakers and participants through the schedule, and moderate the plenary discussions. The Deputy Mayor of the city of Athens, hosting the event, will start the Seminar with a word of welcome. Mr Eric Briat, Deputy Director for urban and social cohesion at the French Commissariat Général à L'Egalité des Territoires (CGET) and co-coordinator of the Partnership, will introduce the audience to the Urban Poverty Partnership. Mr Philippe DeCoene, Deputy Mayor of Kortrijk (Belgium) responsible for Social Affairs including anti-poverty, will deliver

the keynote speech, in which he will focus on the main topics of urban poverty from the city perspective, including people-based and place-based aspects of the topic. After the keynote, the two experts will present the scoping paper, which will constitute the core of the Seminar. The Workshops series will be moderated by couples consisting of a policy-maker and a technical expert.

To ensure that the themes are approached from all relevant perspectives, we will invite

experts from different domains: e.g. policymakers and practitioners, academics,

organisations representing the private sector and civil society. We aim to invite a total of 50

experts, including members of the partnership.

4.5. Role of the EUKN

The EUKN organises the Seminar in close cooperation with the Partnership Urban Poverty.

Together with the coordinators of the Partnerships, CGET (France) and SPP Integration

Sociale (Belgium). The programme is developed and the scoping paper of the partnership is

developed by Urban Poverty experts Laura Colini and Ivan Tosics.

The EUKN has offered to organise the seminar to the Partnership as part of the investment

EUKN has reserved to support the Urban Agenda for the EU. The conference will be free of

charge in order to give stakeholders outside the partnership the give knowledge support to

the Partnership.

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the Urban Agenda for the EU of better regulation, better funding and better knowledge (exchange).


4.8. Venue requirements
